As of 25th February 2019 an ISGE team consisting of Prof. Bruno Van Herendael, Dr. Adel Shervin, and Kareem spent a week at the CHRACERH (Centre Hospitalier de Recherche Appliqué en Chirurgie Endoscopique et Reproduction Humaine) to hold Train the Trainers course.

This is a Clinical Center for Applied Research in Endoscopic Surgery and Human Reproduction and is considered the ISGE Center of Excellence in West Africa in Yaoundé, Cameroon.

The course, which was attended by 30 candidates, consisted of didactic lectures as well as hands-on training in suturing and performing live surgeries ranging from operative hysteroscopies to hysterectomies and endometriosis surgeries.

Gynaecological Endoscopy - a tale of vision

In a time when open surgery was a norm, two visionaries, Dr Harry Reich and Dr Ray Garry, the driving forces to establishing Gynaecological Endoscopy Journal; gave a voice to minimally invasive surgical practice, as advancements in technology were fundamental and inevitable.

Gynaecological Endoscopy Journal was first established in 1992, under the leadership of Adam Magos, and supported by the British Society for Gynaecological Endoscopy and the Australasian Gynaecological Endoscopy Society.

In the very first year, 38 original articles, majority related to hysteroscopy, including a case series of 850 cases describing complications of hysteroscopy by Dr Hill, Dr Maher, Dr Wood, and colleagues. Most prominently, by the end of the first year, the journal became the official journal of the European Society of Hysteroscopy.

Dr Peter Maher (from Australia) who was present for a few of the founding meetings fondly recalls the early days of endoscopy when there were no trainers or textbooks to guide clinical practice, describing it to be time when "flying by the seat of your pants was the rule of the day".

In subsequent years, the journal continued to publish prominent clinical practice papers on topics like the Palmer's point, the Hutchon knot pusher, gasless synchronized laparovaginal hysterectomy, and controversial topics. Given its success, by 2002, Gynaecological Endoscopy became the official of few more prominent societies like the European Society for Gynaecological Endoscopy, the International Society for Gynaecological Endoscopy, and the Italian Society for Gynaecological Endoscopy.

DID YOU KNOW: As a result of this journal not being in Index Medicus more than 700 articles from some of the great pioneers of gynaecological endoscopy have been lost forever!

ENDOSCOPY – AN EVOLUTION!

Looking back...


Laparoscopy was first performed in Russia, Germay, and Scandinavia, in the early 20th Century. Over the next 20 years, successfully procedures were published from the USA and many European countries – with the first report of laparoscopy in gynecology performed by Hope in the USA to diagnose an extrauterine pregnancy, in 1937.

The Speed of Dark

The catastrophic events of World War II, led to significant disruptions globally, a period characterized as the 'speed of dark'. Despite unspeakable devastations, dedicated physicians from around the world kept their patients the central focus of their lives, continuing the work of Kalk, Ruddock, and others.

Laparoscopy was abandoned in the USA in 1939, and replaced by culdoscopy advanced by Decker since his debut in 1944. In fact, culdoscopy became so popular that it essentially brought laparoscopy into a state of near extinction in the USA. Advances in other imaging technologies just emerging at this time, such as radiology and ultrasound, also helped to curtail interest.

World War II also led to considerable constraints in the development of laparoscopy due to difficulties with language and communication as well as deficiencies in the light sources and in the lenses. The problems with lighting were overcome by Fourestiere, Gladu and Voulmiere from Paris who invented cold light illumination in 1943 and in lenses by Hopkins, Professor of Physics in Reading University, who replaced the old elliptical lenses with the rod lens in 1953. These two inventions improved the intensity of light and the clarity of vision which made the procedure much safer.



The Pioneer Dr. Raoul Palmer

The credit for the development of modern laparoscopy goes to Dr. Raoul Palmer, who worked in his private clinic in Paris during the German occupation assisted by his wife, Dr. Elizabeth Palmer, and presented his early experiences to the French Society of Obstetrics and Gynaecology in 1947.
